Letter from the Vicarage by the Reverend Nicholas Anderson

H anging in the Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum in Glasgow is an astonishingly beautiful painting by Sandro Botticelli of the Annunciation. Botticelli was an important Florentine Renaissance artist who excelled in painting both religious and Greek mythological scenes.

His depiction of the Annunciation is a delightfully realistic presentation of three-dimensional space in which the Angel Gabriel hurries to tell the Virgin Mary that she is to bear God's Son, Jesus. As rays of gold representing God's grace radiate towards her, Mary's modest, poor and humble bow indicate that she has accepted this precious mission.

The Angel Gabriel seems to float across a long-arched corridor behind which can be seen a lake, trees, and a hillside. Botticelli, like many Renaissance artists, became adept at creating perspective, which was a new discovery based on mathematics. The straight lines recede at carefully worked out intervals towards a fixed vanishing point in the background. The figures and objects in the foreground were also painted larger than those in the background to help make sense of perspective.

The Annunciation to the Blessed Virgin, as told to us in Luke's Gospel (Luke 1:26-38) is both a past event and a present reality. It is an annunciation to the entire human race that the Son and Word of God has become enfleshed. What happened physically in Mary happens spiritually in everyone who seeks to live a life that is purified of all that holds us back from authenticity.

So, every time we seek to say, 'Let it be with me according to your word' (Luke 1:38) we relinquish control; we surrender to the Mystery of God; we entrust ourselves to the Unknowing, and we open our lives to God's presence. 'Let it be' are words of creation echoing God's 'Let there be...' The 14th century Archbishop of Thessalonica, St. Gregory Palamas, speaking of Mary says, 'Having been fashioned by God through grace ... she shaped God in human form.'

60A Cravells Road Harpenden, Herts Established since 1964 Another important mystical writer who can speak to our age is the Dominican Friar Meister Eckhart, a notable teacher – he lectured in Paris and Cologne – and charismatic preacher, who was quite unique in his approach. In one sermon that is genuinely his, he says:

We are all meant to be mothers of God. What good is it to me if this eternal birth of the divine Son takes place unceasingly but does not take place within myself? And what good is it to me if Mary is full of grace if I am not also full of grace? What good is it to me for the Creator to give birth to his Son if I also do not give birth to him in my time and my culture? This, then, is the fullness of time. When the Son of God is begotten in us.

Eckhart's questions invite us to see humanity, and not Bethlehem, as the true birthplace of God. Obviously, he is not denying the historical events of either the Annunciation or Christ's birth, but is rather making the point that unless they address us now they have little purpose.

God, he says in his Christmas sermons, has chosen humanity to give birth, to give life, to make real, God in this world. That says a lot about what God thinks of us. So often we look at ourselves and actually downplay who we are, 'I'm only human. What do you expect?' But God looks at us and says, 'Humanity, created in my image and likeness. They shall be the ones through whom, by whom, and in whom my Son will be born.'

Meister Eckhart, in many ways a perplexing figure, both invites and challenges us to answer his question this Christmas. How will we give birth to the Son of God in our time and in our culture? In our local community of Harpenden, in our schools and workplaces, in our families, in our churches, in meeting the needs of the poor, in speaking for justice, in our relationships, in our brokenness and pain, in our joys and celebrations?

May God send His angel to purify, illumine, and perfect us so that we may be eternally blessed with God.

From the Churchwardens

I n September, the PCC considered a proposal from the design group of Project Phoenix to progress to the planning stage of a two-storey building for out new parish centre. We are most grateful to the design group for the care with which they have considered the architects' plans, presented to the congregation and considered all the questions and comments in response. While the planning process continues we will be considering the next steps in terms of fundraising.

Many members of the congregation attended the service for the induction of Revd Mmasape Zilhe in her post as the new Methodist minister in Southdown. We are delighted to welcome her, and look forward to many shared initiatives with Southdown Methodists.

We held a cheese and wine evening in late September, at which we were entertained both by Emma McGrath, a local singer, and by James Brown, our curate. We are grateful to the committee who put this together, particularly Jackie Dodd and Steve Whiting.

We celebrated our Harvest Thanksgiving this year on 1 October with an allage service in which the singing was led by an augmented choir (which we hope will be able to lead the singing at other special services) and the prayers were led by the Brownies. As always, there was a wonderful collection of flowers, fruit and vegetables decorating all corners of our church and many welcome donations of produce for the Food Bank. The Bishop's Harvest Appeal this year was 'Full of Beans', which is supporting the development of community projects in rural areas of the Philippines. Lauryn's sermon gave us some entertaining insights into beans, helped by some scientific facts provided by Margaret Charlston, who works at Rothamsted.

We were delighted to welcome Emma Bresslaw, who already makes an important contribution to the life of St John's in many ways, including as PCC Secretary, as a Lay Leader of Worship. Emma wrote about her training in the last edition of the magazine, and is now licensed by the bishop and accepted as a member of the ministerial team here, leading Evensong occasionally on Sundays and joining in the daily services of morning and evening prayer, to which all are welcome.

As a church, our policy is to give 10% of our total income to charitable causes. For the past year we have been supporting EMBRACE, the Church Urban Fund, Christian Aid and the St Albans & District Foodbank, in addition to one-off donations to specific appeals. For 2018 we have agreed to continue supporting EMBRACE and to contribute towards the running costs of Harpenden Citizens Advice; we will be asking the congregation to nominate other charities over the next month and will report on the decision in the next edition.

Work is progressing on our new website, which we hope to launch well before Christmas. Do look out for it!Details of our Christmas services are given elsewhere in the magazine; we would be delighted to welcome you to St John's over the festive period.

Women's World Day of Prayer

This international and ecumenical event, which is always held on the first Friday in March, sees women from a chosen country take responsibility for preparing the service, and this year it is the turn of the Christian women of Suriname. (Where's that? Yes, I wasn't sure either!) Suriname lies in the north-eastern part of South America and is part of the Guianas, meaning 'land of many waters'. Climate change is a very real concern for the people there, as 15% of their land is coastal and less than two metres above sea level, whilst 90% of the country is covered by pristine tropical rain forest. It is therefore entirely appropriate that their theme should be 'All God's Creation is very good', based on Genesis 1:31.

Women's World Day of Prayer seems to have a bit of an image problem in the UK these days, being associated with elderly ladies getting together on a weekday for an extra service and a cup of tea. The reality is so very different!

Starting on the international dateline, this service will be shared across the world, over 24 hours, in some 170 countries, translated into more than 60 languages, and will involve an estimated three million women, men and young people from all backgrounds. Each year as we prepare for the Day of Prayer, we are encouraged to learn about the lives of women in different countries, to pray with and for them and to turn all our prayers into positive action.

Protecting our fragile planet is a challenge for us all, so please do join us on 2 March. All welcome, including men!

Helping hand for Harpenden

E very year, just about now, every home in Harpenden finds a purple envelope bearing the message 'Help us to help others' on the doormat.

Not an unusual message perhaps, but uniquely the Harpenden Trust Christmas Appeal delivers, through the generosity of Harpenden people, help and support only to those who live in the AL5 postcode area. That has been the Fund's remit since it began almost 70 years ago.

From the Trust Centre, not far from St John's Church at the bottom of Southdown Road by the bus stop, pours forth help to the tune of over £70,000 a year for families and individuals as well as separately funded aid for organisations in the town, ranging from the Harpenden Colts to improvements to playgrounds in places like the Oakley Road play area, and provides or updates amenities in our local schools.

The proceeds of the appeal allow the Trust's Care Fund to work with people who need some help. So it:

• Provides grants for help with household bills, vouchers for food and clothing, and help with furniture and white goods

- Supports families to meet the cost of essential school trips
- Offers coffee and tea for pensioners twice a week, in town and in Southdown
- Delivers Christmas parcels and summer coach outings.

The Trust's volunteers also brighten the day by providing companionship through visits to lonely and often elderly people.

The Community Fund (totally separately from the Care Fund) makes grants to support appropriate community projects.

It goes without saying that the Trust always needs more help, and is always ready to warmly welcome volunteers – to help perhaps once a week, once a fortnight, once a month or even once a year. You might be able to be a befriender, to help at coffee mornings, or be a volunteer driver. The list is endless and the rewards are great.

When you look at the purple envelope please see it as an opportunity to be a Harpenden person helping a Harpenden person.

Christmas should be materialistic



E very year we get given more tat. Every year we buy more than just the lie that possessions satisfy.

Every year we hear someone complain that Christmas has been hijacked by Capitalism.

But right to its core this has always been a materialistic festival.

Bear with me.

The story of Christmas is that God was born into the world as a tiny and vulnerable little boy. The Divine became human, shared our fleshly experience, our wonders and woes.

The Divine became material. Christmas is a festival to celebrate this materialism.

The fancy word is incarnation – like chilli con carne. Incarnation means that God became meaty. God shared our physical, fleshy, human nature.

I wince a little every time I sing the line Little Lord Jesus, no crying he makes. Working for the church, I have to do that a lot!

Jesus would have screamed like any other kid, red cheeked and annoying. He would have needed calming and burping and changing just as you and I did. Fully human. God enters and knows our human experience from the inside and in some sense He is our understanding companion in our struggles and pains.

More than this, though, the incarnation validates and celebrates the material. If blood, sweat and tears were good enough for the Son of God, they are good enough for us. The physical world is utterly charged with the Divine and so let us be properly materialistic. Let us give the material world the respect it is due.

That means presents that are worthwhile in respect both to producer and receiver.

That means feasts that celebrate the effort, skill and dignity of food producers, cooks, and animals.

It means realizing the indignity of a thoughtless last-minute-panic present the sort that will be land fill in a few weeks and for a few centuries in the case of most plastic.

Let's do materialism properly.

The gospels are clear that Jesus is into parties, and gifts, and feasts.

Let's do all of that with joy as we celebrate this festival of Divine Materialism!

My name is Emma and I pray

T t sounds like a confession of a bad hab-L it, doesn't it? but I am very open about it and would readily admit that I actually pray quite a lot. I suspect that this prayer habit of mine has really got me to where I am at the moment on my path of discovery and enlightenment as a believer. Taking the step to becoming a LLW ('Lay Leader of Worship', for anyone who didn't read last quarter's magazine) was not part of any pre-existing, long-term plan that I had made for myself, quite the opposite really, and I am surprised, but equally elated, by the turn of events in my life. I honestly believe that it is prayer that has been the motivator for me, the fuel in the tank if you like, that has driven, and indeed continues to drive my faith forward. I am very much aware that I am still wearing my 'L' plates as a disciple and I offer my personal thoughts on prayer very much with that caveat in mind.

Some years ago, I decided that instead of giving anything up for Lent, I would attend mid-week Communion in the Lady Chapel at St John's, which is held every Wednesday at 9.30 am. Numbers are sometimes quite low but there is often a palpable spirituality about the time shared with fellow worshippers. Lent came and went, but I discovered that I really wanted to continue attending these services. Over time, it has become a highlight of my worshipping week. Our serene and beautiful chapel provides a holy and quiet space in which to worship, and the atmosphere is highly conducive to prayer. I have had some of my best experiences of prayer on these Wednesday mornings (although midweek Evening Prayer held at 5 pm is now in hot

contention for the top spot). Looking back, I think it would be fair to blame Wednesday mornings for really turning on the ignition which lit the spark to my prayer fuel!

I walk my dogs every day for a couple of hours (another great opportunity for prayer) and I always carry my mobile phone. Should the need arise. I am contactable and able to contact others. It is a reassuring presence in my pocket. As I certainly find regular phone conversations with close family members and friends a source of great joy and a way of keeping in touch with their lives, getting to know them better and better as the years go by, so I have discovered that the same is true of prayer; the more time I spend talking to God, the more I feel his presence in my life; he supports me like a friend, he lifts my spirits, he makes my life richer and more joyous. Like my phone, but much more so, he is a reassuring presence wherever I go and, unlike my phone, there is always reception. He hears me if I am walking round the fields at Rothamsted; he hears me when I am at home, in the car, abroad, in church; he hears me if I am alone or if I am with others - wherever and whenever.

Prayer and worship are not, in my opinion, the preserve of a building called a church, nor of a period of time called a service; I do not have to kneel nor do I have to find special words to say. They can happen wherever and whenever because God's church is our whole world and his divine and wonderful love for us all is not constrained or limited by time or place. Recognising that his phone line is open all hours is both exhilarating and enabling.

Advent and Lent, those two great periods of preparation in the Christian calendar, provide great scope and opportunity for regular prayer, either alone or with others. During Advent, which starts this year on December 3, I shall find an appropriate book to complement my prayer habit, which will have a wonderful boost as there will be a service of Night Prayer (or 'Compline' to use its traditional name) every weekday in our Lady Chapel at 8 pm. This short service, full of calm words and soothing imagery, will ensure that my Christmas lists and preparations do not take on the starring role during December. The birth of our Lord. Jesus Christ, in a humble stable in Bethlehem, his ultimate sacrifice on the cross at Calvary and glorious Resurrection and Ascension to save us from our sins – that should be at the foundation of, and our motive for, all our seasonal activities.

In our hectic and rapid world, the qualities of stillness and calm have been sadly overlooked, yet without them we forget to really live the moment. The Bible tells us that Jesus liked a party as much as the next man, but they should not dominate our every waking moment or preoccupy our every thought. If we are always rushing onto the next thing, or worrying about the past, the present fails to register; but it is precious, a gift from God, and deserves our full attention. In the words of the American theologian Frederick Buechner, 'all moments are key moments and life itself is grace'.

The final week of Advent raises the bar even higher in the prayer stakes as we enter the period of what are known as the 'O Antiphons', or responses, which is one of the oldest forms of Christian prayer, dating back to the 6 or 7 century. The prayers were recited as part of the nightly service of Vespers (and included during Mass in the Roman Catholic Church) from 17-23 December and each begins with a title for Christ drawn from the Old Testament Book of Isaiah. Thus, we have: O Sapienta (Wisdom), O Adonai (Lord and Ruler of the House of Israel), O Radix Jesse (Root of Jesse), O Clavis David (Key of David), O Oriena (Dayspring), O Rex Gentium (King of the Gentiles) and finally O Emmanuel (God with Us). If, like me, you spend time most days juggling anagrams for either crosswords or Scrabble, you will find it interesting to note that the first letters of the titles in Latin are SARCORE. Read backwards that is ero cras, meaning 'Tomorrow I come/shall be'.

If prayer is not part of your life at the moment, I would urge you to try it out and 'Pick up the phone' this Advent, wherever you are and whatever time of day it is, and have a conversation. My own experience leads me to be confident that you will not be disappointed and the conversation will not remain one-sided for long. (Come and join us in church, if you think it would help; everyone is very welcome to every service, be it Sunday or midweek.) Prayer works. What you put into prayer you will be more than amply rewarded for. It is not a magic solution to human problems and woes, and it can be quite an emotional experience, but it is the best way to get closer to God and that brings riches and joys way beyond my powers of description or comprehension.

With every blessing for a prayerful Advent and a joyous and peaceful Christmas, Emma Bresslaw

HCCC is run by two co-ordinators and staffed by volunteers. The centre is open on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month from 1 - 4 pm. All volunteers need to undergo DBS vetting and also attend three or four training sessions a year, which are usually on a Saturday morning for a couple of hours before the Centre opens. There are four teams of volunteers who attend the sessions on a rota basis and thus about six times a year. They set up the hall with toys, games etc., of which the Centre has a good supply, and then support (not supervise) the contact. Many parents are allowed to leave the Centre for all or part of the session; others stay there for the whole time. Afterwards the volunteers tidy up and debrief.

It is not an onerous task but worthwhile; to enable children to see their parents is hugely rewarding.

Project Phoenix – Parish Centre

W ith a new project name symbolising regeneration and renewal, the Parish Centre, aka Project Phoenix, has completed a major milestone.

Over the summer, our architects, MEB Design Ltd, working with our technical team, developed various different design options which were presented to the congregation on Sunday 25 June. At the back of the church, a number of plans and drawings were displayed on easels, open to scrutiny, comments and feedback from a very interested audience. Our architect, Mark Eddison, presented an overview of the process to date, and the details of eight options, which had been developed as part of the feasibility study to meet our brief. After outlining the pros

and cons of each option, he then shared the recommendation of two short-listed options, A & B: one single storey, one two storey, both connecting into the church near the pulpit. After a three-week period of consultation in which we gathered feedback from the congregation on these options, MEB completed the feasibility study, which the technical team submitted with their recommendations to the PCC. At their October meeting, the PCC endorsed the progression of option A, the two-storey option, based on cost, practicality and reduced impact on the external space. So now the next steps will be to apply to the council for planning permission and to begin the exciting task of fund-raising.

Safeguarding is regularly reviewed by the Parish Council and updated to reflect policy developments and the current context.
