Advent and Light by the Reverend James Brown

don't know about you but I love this time of year when the nights stretch to overtake the days and the cold starts to creep in. The reason they are so cheering is not for the dark and the cold themselves, but for the light and the warmth that meet them. This is a time for candles, and fairy lights, for the new street lights decorating Southdown. This is a season for chunky jumpers, long, huddled evenings, and the cosy sanctuary of home; safe indoors against the weather outside.

Light in the darkness is a key image in this season of Advent. At church through Advent we light special candles week by week: we have Christingles, we decorate the tree with things that sparkle, and ultimately we think of Jesus as the light of the world. What does that mean? Christians believe that Jesus came into the hardships as well as the beauties of this world, into the injustice as much as the harmony; God arriving into the great complexity of human history, God with skin on to enlighten this world from within. O Come, O Come Emmanuel; a vulnerable infant, delicate child. Jesus was born into a complicated family life and a treacherous political situation where he ultimately became a refugee, fleeing with his parents for fear of his life. He knows this world from the inside out and he shone as a beacon of hope and transformation, offering a different way; a light in the darkness.

The thing about this metaphor of light that I find so powerful is its simple physics: light and dark are not opposites. Rather darkness is simply the absence of light. It takes only a little light to dispel the greatest darkness. Of course there are horrors in this world but to find God in the midst of them is truly enlightening.

However your year has been, however challenging or troubled, I pray that this Advent and Christmas you may know the light of Christ; that he may guide and lighten your way, and reveal things hidden in the shadows and lead you to all that is joyful and peaceful.

Throughout this season there are many wonderful events planned at St John's. You are all very welcome, so please look over the list that you'll find later in this magazine. Amongst the many things on offer you'll find traditional services of nine lessons and carols, carols in the pub, and a special Christmas Eve walking story event for the whole family.

I wish you a joyous Advent, a merry Christmas, and a happy New Year. *Revd James Brown*

Letter from the Churchwardens

nce more we find ourselves nearing the end of the year, anticipating the joys of Christmas but wondering where the year has gone. It has been a busy and eventful year in many respects, containing moments of joy and celebration, and leaving us with both challenges and opportunities for the future.

Looking ahead, we would love to welcome you to share the excitement of Advent and Christmas with us. The services on offer are many and varied: our Advent worship and weekly Night Prayer; carol singing at various Southdown locations; a special Advent and Christmas coffee concert; the Junior Church Nativity Play; our service of Nine Lessons and Carols; and our Midnight Mass and Christmas Day Festival Eucharist celebrations. Details of all of these, and other services, can be found in this magazine.

The past months have included a time of sadness as we saw the departure of our vicar, Nicholas Anderson, who has retired and moved out of the vicarage. After four and a half years of sharing his ministry with us, he goes with all our prayers and thanks, and we wish him and Anneke every happiness in his retirement north of the border.

Nicholas's last service at St John's was on Sunday 30th September. The churchwardens and our curate James Brown paid tribute to Nicholas's work with us during his ministry in the parish, and we sent him on his way with gifts from the congregation, drinks and canapés in the church hall, and our very best wishes.

So Nicholas's departure once more puts us in the position of a vacancy, and the process of selecting the new incumbent is already underway. The churchwardens have met with the Bishop of Hertford and the Rural Dean, and the Bishop has met with the PCC to discuss our needs, wishes and requirements. The PCC has agreed a detailed Parish Profile which describes the parish - where we are, who we are, what we do - and defines the criteria we are looking for in a new incumbent.

An advertisement for the position has been published in the Church Times and, with the parish profile, on the diocesan website. We are hopeful that potential applicants will respond enthusiastically and positively to our needs and future challenges and we expect that the selection process, which will involve representation from the parish as an integral part, will conclude before the end of the year.

In the meantime, the responsibility for the day-to-day activities of the parish remains with the churchwardens. It is intended that whilst this is naturally a period of change, life will continue as normal and the regular services and activities will continue. We are fortunate to be supported by a strong ministerial team who will continue to provide our spiritual direction, and we are particularly grateful to our neighbouring parishes, retired clergy, and the Rural Dean for providing support to us during this time.

The Song of Mary the oldest Advent hymn

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, *My spirit rejoices in God my saviour;* He has looked with favour on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed The almighty has done great things for me And holy is his name. He has mercy on those who fear him From generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm and has scattered the proud in their conceit, Casting down the mighty from their thrones and lifting up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty. He has come to the aid of his servant Israel, to remember his promise of mercy, The promise made to our ancestors, to Abraham and his children for ever. Luke (1:46-55).

he Song of Mary (the Magnificat) is one of the most powerful prayers of the church, sung or spoken daily in millions of Christian churches throughout the world.

Finding herself pregnant by the power of the Holy Spirit, Mary goes to visit her cousin Elizabeth and sings the canticle that joyfully proclaims her faith in the God of Israel. She praises his divine mercy shown to her, a poor, peasant woman, and then, in both historic and prophetic language, expands this into praising his gracious mercy shown to all oppressed people. The recurrent Biblical theme of reversal is repeated once more – the lowly will be defended and the arrogant brought to their knees, the lost will be redeemed, the defenceless will be protected, and liberation and life in all its glory and abundance will be the gift to those at the bottom of the social hierarchy. The tables will be totally turned over by a God who is not impressed by wealth, status or power but prefers to favour the pure of spirit and the faithful. This is a powerful message as important today as it was two thousand years ago.

In the words of Pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German theologian, the Song of Mary 'is the oldest Advent hymn'. In a sermon preached in 1933, he defined it as 'a hard, strong, inexorable song about collapsing thrones and humbled lords of this world, about the power of God and the powerlessness of humankind', rather than a sweet Christmas carol.

We must imagine Mary, a poor unmarried girl, living in Galilee, a faithful Jew, leading an unremarkable life, coping with the domestic chores that were her lot. Her world was male dominated and her opportunities minimal. At the behest and arrangement of her parents she finds herself engaged to be married to Joseph, a carpenter who will hopefully prove to be a good and kind husband. Then, before she can even marry him, her life is turned upside down by the visitation of an angel asking her to carry in her womb and give birth to God's Son, who will be the long-awaited Messiah. She would have been justified in being just a little bit put out, perhaps weighing up the pros and cons of the situation she finds herself in, but not a bit of it. With every fibre of her being - her body, soul and spirit - she glorifies God who has chosen her for this extraordinary role. This is no quietly spoken hymn of praise but one that is confidently and assuredly proclaimed with a lungful of air to leave not even a hair's breadth of doubt that she willingly undertakes this privilege. Her consent to bearing God's son is no meek act of submission, a passivity and 'feminine' weakness, which has been

so unfairly attributed to her in the past, rather she co-owns the divine antipathy to whatever crushes the lowly. Here, as Elizabeth Johnson the contemporary American theologian expresses, there is 'solidarity with divine outrage over the degradation of life and with the divine promise to repair the world'. Whilst in every sense she is a woman, the misogynistic definition of 'femininity' is rewritten. With lungs full of joy in God and his desire to grant victory to the oppressed, Mary is a prophet not a subjugated woman.

Mary continues the strong Jewish tradition of female singers, and the sentiments she expresses strongly resemble those sung by Hannah in the book of Solomon (1 Sam. 2:1-10). The background circumstances to each are similar, both sung by women who find themselves unexpectantly pregnant, Hannah because she has been barren for so long (as indeed was Elizabeth) and Mary because she is a virgin. All three women bear offspring who will be Holy - Hannah's son, Solomon, is offered to the Lord as his servant as soon as he is weaned and then God calls him by name when he is just a child sleeping in the temple. John the Baptist, Elizabeth's son, will announce the dawn of the new age. Mary's son, our Lord Jesus, is the fulfillment of a promise made explicit through the unfolding of Luke's Gospel. Yet the scene is absurd. The coming of the Messiah who will redeem Israel is anticipated and proclaimed by two marginalised and pregnant women - one young, poor and unmarried, the other far beyond the normal age of conceiving.

There is nothing passive or gentle

about the vocabulary of Mary's Song. Look at the words employed: 'strength', 'scattered the proud', 'cast down the mighty', 'sent the rich away empty' – God's mercy and grace has never been, and will never be, the preserve of the rich and powerful; it is not a commodity that can be bought with either money or status. His mercy and assistance will be shown to those who are faithful and serve him, 'lifting up the lowly' and nourishing the hungry with the bread of heaven.

What opens as a hymn of deep, personal thanks and love of God becomes bold and daring, proclaiming the upside-down world inaugurated by Jesus' incarnation. It announces the subversive character of Jesus' arrival. The ordered church, political and social systems of the day will all be radically changed. Is it both 'the oldest advent hymn' and, indeed, the greatest advent hymn? Yes, because its singer has within her womb the life that will launch the messianic age in which the tables will be turned, in which a new social order will be established and the hungry fed. Mary's song foretells the advent of the dawn of Christianity, foretells the words that her son himself will speak in the Beatitudes and of a movement that will bring about seismic, global and eternal transformations. Her womb has been filled with the protagonist of this change and, in the words of Martin Luther, her Song was sung 'not for herself alone but for all of us to sing it after her.' In doing so, we stand with Mary and the whole communion of saints. close to the God who is the source of all our hope and joy. We are summoned to play our part in God's plan to build a just world, to do what we can to relieve suffering, so that his will may be done on earth as it is in heaven. Our hope finds its voice in Mary's Song, resting securely on this: God is good, and God keeps his promises.

Getting to know the congregation

An interview with Christine Kenyon

How long have you been in Southdown and what do you like about the local community?

I've been here since 1982, when our eldest daughter was one year old, and went to the church at St John's more or less straight away. I love Southdown - it's so friendly! I help out at Sauncey Wood school in Batford. I go one morning a week to the reception class. I used to teach; primary level is my absolute favourite age. I was pleased to retire, what with all the tick boxes that came in, but I love being a volunteer.

I also go to a monthly book group, which I do with a group of friends that I've known for ages, and I also belong to a Scottish dancing group in Batford. The teacher is just amazing! She's over 80 and still dances if we're short on numbers. I also used to love singing; I still do, but I haven't really got time for that so I just sing along at home to CDs!

And how are you involved at St John's?

I've always done the coffees after church. It started off when my parents moved to Harpenden to be near me as they got older. We came from a very vibrant church and my mum wanted to do all sorts of things but she was getting quite frail so we did the coffees and my girls would help, too. When my girls were growing up I helped with the Sunday school. I've always cared about children being involved, as they're the future of the church, and now I'm involved with Little Acorns.

What is Little Acorns?

It's a group for toddlers and their mums, dads or carers. We meet on a Thursday between 1.30pm and 2.45pm. There is a play session with trikes and cycles and lots of toys for the children. A little boy asked me last week for dinosaurs, so I have spent a lot of time looking round the charity shops for dinosaurs! We have hot drinks for the adults and also a little snack time for the kids, followed by some singing. It's really lovely and it's growing.

It sounds like you're quite involved with things at St John's. What does it mean to you to be a part of that Christian community?

Well, what it means to me is that I'm trying to do what God wants me to do. The Sunday School was important because I wanted our girls to grow up with a Christian background, although I never forced them to come to church. I thought they should come because they want to come. I really did feel God calling me to Little Acorns and it's been quite amazing really! So it means something to be part of the church community but, because my husband doesn't believe, there is a bit of limit as to how much I can get involved. He is, however, supportive of my beliefs/ involvement with the church and he never objected to the children going to church. He's always agreed that it's up to them to decide. And now we have one daughter that is very Christian and spiritual and one that doesn't believe at all - so one of each!


